What do Election Day (Nov. 6), Thanksgiving (Nov. 22) and Chanukah (beginning the evening of Dec. 2) have in common? They each embody both American and Jewish fundamental values.

On Tuesday, Nov. 6, we will go to the polls to vote for candidates we believe will best advocate for the issues we support. No matter where you fall on the political spectrum or who you are voting for, just by exercising your democratic rights, you are paying tribute to our most deeply held religious principles.

The Jewish view of human society affirms that all people, not only Jews, are equal in the eyes of God. Every creation embodies a spark of the Divine and therefore deserves respect. According to the Mishna, a compendium of Jewish law and lore, Adam, the first man, was created out of dust gathered from all corners of the world so that no people could say their ancestors were greater in the eyes of God than others. As Thomas Jefferson wrote referring to every human being, "They are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights." Each time we vote, we acknowledge this truth. Every pull of the lever or circle we fill in on the ballot carries the same weight, regardless of one's wealth, social status, heritage or power; it is an affirmation of our equal status in the eyes of the state and the dignity with which each of us is endowed by our Creator.

Our American celebration of Thanksgiving,

while not a specifically sectarian religious holiday, is a time to give thanks for the blessing of living in this country, a land of freedom and liberty. Gratitude is an inherently spiritual expression. The *motzi* said before meals acknowledges that so much of what we have is a function of our unearned but much-cherished good fortune. Similarly, Thanksgiving is an opportunity to recognize that our abundance is the result of grace. Though sadly there are still those who know the ache of hunger in America, few of us experience the hardship of poverty and want. Thanksgiving is an occasion to appreciate the cornucopia with which we are blessed.

Chanukah is probably the most "American" holiday on the Jewish calendar. Just as

our nation's early settlers came to the New World seeking religious freedom, so did our Maccabee ancestors fight to overthrow the oppressive yolk of the Greco-Syrians who sought to deny the Jews' right to practice their faith. According to a central tenet of the Jewish worldview, every human being has the right to worship their God as they see fit. Tolerance for the beliefs of others and respect for religious freedom is one of our most cherished American birthrights.

More than 350 years ago, the first Jews set foot on American soil. Though Jews have thrived in other lands, nowhere has there been greater accord between the core values of our Jewish heritage and the principles of America's cherished democracy.

We affirm these values when we go to the polls to vote. On Thanksgiving, we have the much-needed opportunity to express our gratitude for the abundance of our blessings, and on Chanukah, we celebrate our own unique Jewish heritage as we embrace and honor the American doctrine of religious freedom and tolerance.

I urge you to pay tribute to this remarkable legacy by voting next Tuesday, and I wish you a happy Thanksgiving and a joyous Chanukah!

The goal was to relive some of our glory days, but also add some spirit to a few events each year at Temple Emanuel in Andover. The band of dads grew from four to seven and they've become known as the "in-house band" at the Temple. Typically, the Abbas perform one Friday night each month as well as during certain holidays and festivals. Several weeks ago while coaching Girls On The Run, we talked to girls about having an “Attitude of Gratitude,” for not only people or things, but also circumstances that they find themselves in. This lesson made me think about the holiday season that is upon us, and what I

have to be grateful for here at Temple Emanuel. Though there is not room to list everything I am grateful for, I did want to highlight a few things:

First and foremost, I want to extend my gratitude to all of our members who are part of our Benefactors Society (a list can

be found on page 14). These benefactors have helped us raise over \$50,000, over and above their dues. Money raised as part of the Benefactors Society allows Temple Emanuel to expand our religious services; provide resources to the Religious School, our youth programs, and Lifelong Learning; as well as allowing our doors to be open to all those who desire affiliation.

Second, I am grateful for the generosity in our community. Derek Leider Masonry recently redid the sidewalks leading up to our main entrance. Over the years the snow and ice have eroded, cracked, and broken our sidewalk. Thanks to Derek’s incredible donation, of both labor and materials, we are going in to the winter season with sidewalks that are new and, most importantly, are safe!

Lastly, I am grateful that we have been awarded a \$100,000 security grant from FEMA. This grant will allow us to begin work on several projects: replacement of our exterior doors, installment of a FOB keyless entry system, installation of interior security cameras, and upgrades to our outdoor lighting. This grant will allow us to make these important security improvements that otherwise would have come out of our Building Fund.

We have much to be grateful for here at Temple Emanuel. From our clergy, our staff and our lay leaders, to the opportunities we are given to learn, pray, to build Jewish identities and continue the traditions that have withstood the test of time! Thank you for being a part of this community and supporting us as we move ever forward!

BOARD OF GOVERNORS

Minutes from Tuesday, September 4, 2018

Capital Campaign – We are one year into our 100th anniversary capital campaign. We transitioned our outside help to Liz Cahn, a local fundraising professional. Based on her advice, we are now looking at creating a financial plan, facilities plan, long-range strategic plan and refining our case – why are we doing this, what will the future of the temple look like, how can we strengthen our case? We need to move from transactional giving to relational giving and we need to take the time to do it right, respect where people are and earn the right to ask for donations.

100th Anniversary - We are creating a committee for the 100th anniversary – it will include a celebration and a focus on history. We are looking for a chair and volunteers for this committee. We should also talk to the Andover Historical Society, Lawrence Historical Society, Jewish Archives in Boston, URJ, etc. We need to brainstorm what the anniversary should look like. Should it be a series of events culminating in a gala or big party? It could be a year-long celebration encompassing every part of the temple and our history. Every group in the temple could have some sort of part in it, for example the temple’s history could be discussed as part of the religious school curriculum. We are open to ideas.

Mission, Vision and Values - We need to develop our mission, vision and values. We need to

figure out who we are as a group by listening to all of the different perspectives of members of our board. We will begin this at our October 16 meeting. As background: mission applies to our purpose, vision applies to where we are headed, and values are how you do it. We need to help figure out the temple’s priorities, how we should get there, how we interact with each other, how we hold each other accountable, etc. These are our pillars for all that we do.

Building – We have installed three new HVAC units, and the preschool put AC units in some classrooms that didn’t have them. The library is now another classroom. We relocated the library into what used to be the bride’s room. This space can also be used as a conference room, meeting room.

Staffing—Erik has become our Facilities Manager. We have a new youth coordinator, Lila Klaus, who will handle TEMTY and the Madrachim program.

Finance – We are consolidating all of our financial books into one set of QuickBooks. This way we can start to see projections as the year goes along, can better track our financial picture.

Programming – We have many upcoming events. Keep an eye on the e-news, website.

A HOME GUIDE FOR CHANUKAH

THE STORY OF CHANUKAH

In the year 168 B.C.E. (Before the Common Era), the Greco-Syrians, under the leadership of King Antiochus IV, ordered the end of all Jewish ritual as it had been practiced for generations. The Jews were shocked and distressed to think that their Temple worship, so much a part of their lives, would come to an end. They did not want to worship pagan gods, nor bow down to idols; neither did they want their Holy Temple profaned.

In Modin, a small country village, there lived a man by the name of Mattathias. He was a devoted Jew and he taught his five sons the importance of living according to the tenets of Judaism. They could not stand by idly as their Temple was being destroyed, nor could they allow the end of the Jewish people.

Judah, one of the five sons, was a brilliant strategist. Joining with his equally devoted brothers, and a small army, he was able to wage a three-year battle, overcoming the much better equipped Greco-Syrian army.

At last, on the 25th day of Kislev, in the year 165 B.C.E., they were successful in pushing out the Greco-Syrian army, and they immediately reclaimed the Holy Temple in Jerusalem. Unfortunately, it had been terribly overrun - defiled and defamed. They quickly cleaned the Temple, restoring it to its original beauty.

In ancient times, Jews would come from all over Israel to worship on various holidays. Sukkot, which is an eight-day holiday that falls in October, had not yet been celebrated that year because of the Greco-Syrians' control of the Temple. After the Temple was cleansed that December (the 25th of Kislev), the people celebrated Sukkot (an October holiday) in December. The following year the Sukkot holiday was celebrated back at its original time in October. But now in December there was a new eight-day holiday. For eight days the Jews everywhere would celebrate *Chanukah*, to remember the miracle of a small group of ill-equipped Jews who were able to overcome a greater and stronger army.

THE LEGEND OF THE OIL

There is also a legend which tells of an incident that happened when the Jews finally reached the Holy Temple. Their task was to light the *Ner Tamid* (the eternal light which still hangs over the Ark in every synagogue) that had been allowed to burn out during the Greco-Syrian occupation. They were only able to find enough special oil to last one day, even though it would take eight days to get more of the special oil needed for the lamp. Miraculously, the oil lasted for eight days, giving them enough time to get more oil!

KINDLING THE CHANUKAH LIGHTS

The *menorah* or *chanukiah* symbolizes the religious freedom for which our people have always fought. The flickering lights remind us of the constant struggle, not only for our own religious liberty, but for all people's struggle for freedom.

Each night at sunset, the candles on the *chanukiah* are lit. The candles are added one each night, from the right to the left. They are lit (using the *shamash*) from left to right. It is a custom to put the *chanukiah* in the window, so that all will be reminded of the great miracle of Chanukah. On Shabbat during Chanukah, the *chanukiah* is lit first, followed by the Sabbath candles.

It is a custom to gather the family together around the menorah (*chanukiah*). The *mitzvah* of lighting the candles should be rotated among the members of the family so that each member has an opportunity to light the *chanukiah* on at least one of the eight nights.

On the first night, the *sh'heh'chee'yanu* prayer is said. It is also a tradition to sing "Maoz Tzur" ("Rock of Ages") following the lighting of the candles on each of the eight nights.

(The candles are placed in the Menorah from right to left, and lit from left to right.)

THE DREIDEL

The most popular of all chanukah games is dreidel. The word comes from the German "dreihen" or to spin, which refers to the "turnover" of events when Judah the Maccabee was able to overcome the unlikely odds, and retake the Holy Temple. There is a tradition that during the time the Jews were forbidden from studying Jewish texts, they played "dreidel" while orally discussing the Talmud. If they were discovered, the dreidel game was a great cover!

The letters on the top (nun, gimmel, hey, shin) refer to the statement, *Nes gadol hayah sham*, "a great miracle happened there." The dreidel is spun by the players, and according to what letter comes out on top, the participants either take out or put in Chanukah gelt (coins).
