In a few weeks we will choose a president. Elections are always spirited, but this one seems even more contentious than usual. We are facing unprecedented tests and trials: an unrelenting pandemic, an economic downturn that has left many people unemployed and far too many of our fellow Americans hungry. There is unrest in our cities as we confront the reality of systemic racism.

It is not unusual on the eve of a presidential election for Americans to be more engaged and vocal about their preferred candidate and as November draws closer, for the debate to become angrier and more personal. This year is

no exception, however with a nation so divided the contest has become even more uncivil and coarse than in the past.

The ugliness of this unpleasant election cycle has left many Americans disenchanted; threats to the integrity of the election process, a disdain for both candidates, and the challenge of keeping safe during a pandemic will keep them from voting. But that's not an option. By not voting we weaken the system that has preserved our democracy for almost 250 years.

For all Americans, voting is a patriotic duty; it is our way of participating in the national dialogue that will ultimately determine our country's destiny. For Jews, entering the voting booth is a sacred act. The right to vote is a blessing and each "pull of the lever" is a prayer, an acknowledgement of our good fortune to be living in this extraordinary land of freedom, liberty and opportunity.

While voting on Election Day is critical, in many ways November 4th, the day after the election, is equally important. That is when the process of healing must begin, as we recommit ourselves to engaging in productive debates, honoring our

differences while acknowledging all that unites us as a nation.

It is a custom among some traditional Jews when reciting the *kaddish* to take three steps back, turn to the right and then to the left before reciting the final words of the prayer,

"May the One who makes peace in the heavens bring peace to us..."

A colleague suggests this might be a good metaphor for this year's election. When it's all over, we need to take a step back, turn to our friends on the right and on the left and acknowledge that only as a relatively united country can we hope to meet the many challenges before us.

Remember, either by mail or in person, every vote counts!

The Importance of Protecting our Home

Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are traditionally the focus of the Fall season. Sukkot comes at the tail end when we are often so tired and ready to get back to normalcy. This year Sukkot will take on new meaning. One of the themes is the importance of our home and protecting that home. If you had asked me this time last year, I would have said to me this means physical security for our building and protecting those who visit from physical harm. And with that in mind, over the last year we did do several security upgrades to our building thanks to the FEMA Security Grant of \$100,000 that we were awarded.

But this year, my response focuses on the protection of those in our community, our spiritual home. In a phrase that has become all too common, our "new normal" means that our building is closed to temple meetings, events and services. It is a Jewish value to protect the lives of those in our community and in order to do that, we have to be cognizant of the risk that any gathering poses to our community.

It also means that we need to care for our mental well-being. For the past 6 months our mind and bodies have functioned as though they were in fight or flight mode. With no end in sight and a transition to back to school, our limits are being pushed even further. We are in the beginning stages of putting together a Well-Being Series with Laura Hillman, Toby Lazerson, and Betsy Kachel. Our first session will focus on Parents and Caregivers with School Age Children. More information will be coming out shortly. As always, please do not hesitate to reach out if there is anything we can do for you.

"Hineni (Here I am)...I have come before You, God, to plead on behalf of Your people Israel."

The moving *Hineni* is known as the "Cantor's Prayer," and is recited, at liberal congregations, at the very beginning of Rosh Hashanah eve. The prayer sets the tone and mood for the duration of the High Holy Days. The cantor, who walks toward the ark while chanting *Hineni* with emotion, pleads to God to look favorably upon his congregation. But what if, when the cantor chants, there is no congregation to be seen?

The pandemic has forced us to become creative, and to adjust our normal routines so that we could adapt to the world's new challenges. For the past several months, Rabbi Goldstein and I have been working hard developing a meaningful High Holy Days experience. To ensure everyone's safety, we pre-recorded the services prior to the holy days. I have to admit that I had doubts as to whether I'd be able to achieve the lofty and meaningful feelings that propel me every year during the Ten Days of Repentance, without our congregants' physical attendance. Yet, the moment I started singing these haunting melodies, together with our amazing soloist, Gitit Shoval, and our talented and devoted musicians, my whole being was transformed. The *Hineni* prayer was elevated to another realm. I felt the entire congregation, all of you, standing with me, spiritually, in the synagogue. That's a testament to the power of our traditions and to our connection with one another.

I want to thank all of the participants; Gitit, the musicians, the Torah readers, the shofar blowers, rabbinic intern Sam Weiss, our volunteers, and of course, Rabbi Goldstein. A special thank you to Jon Samel, his son Andrew, and the videographers for making our holiest time of the year so special. Jon oversaw the sound and Andrew was the director (and everything else!) of the whole project.

I am so excited to start the season and to welcome back our preschool and religious school students. And I'm looking forward to a new year of learning, celebrating, praying and creating new memories together.

High Holy Day Recipe Spotlight Sweet and Sour Brisket

Ingredients

- 5-6 pounds single brisket
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup white vinegar
- 1 cup ketchup
- 1 cup water
- 2 medium onions, sliced
- 1 clove garlic, minced

Directions

1. Place the brisket into a Dutch oven. Season one side liberally with salt and pepper.
2. Sear meat quickly over medium/high heat.
3. Turn meat over and repeat steps 1 and 2.
4. Add and brown the onions and garlic,
5. Add the remaining ingredients.
6. Lower heat to simmer—medium/low.
7. Cook covered for 2 1/2 hours on the top of the stove.

Four Generations of Legacy

Neilah means “closing of the gates.” As the final service of the holiest and most solemn day of the year, it is our last opportunity to ask God to seal us in the Book of Life and to accept our repentance and reflections. Many of us may feel weak and tired by this point; the combination of a 24 hour fast and standing with the ark open for the final hour of this most holy day forces us to look within to gain our strength.

I have had the honor and unique perspective of not only being able to look within during the Neilah service, but look out at the congregation from where I stand on the bimah. Even better, I have been able to look beside me and see my brothers, my father, and my grandfather surrounding me. For as long as I can remember, the Shacks have had the honor of standing on the bimah during the Neilah service and taking part in the Havdalah prayers.

My great-grandparents attended the shul across the street from Temple Emanuel in Lawrence and my family has followed the congregation to Andover now through four more generations – my grandparents, parents, my brothers and me,

and now, one more generation in my new baby daughter, Isabelle. This year, as the four generations of Shacks stood together for the virtual Neilah service, I felt especially close to the Temple congregation and community. As we stood together, I thought about my Temple nursery school teachers, my extended family, and old friends and classmates. I think about our family’s story here and all of the life milestones the Shacks have celebrated at Temple Emanuel and with Rabbis Roth and Goldstein – my father Bill’s Bar Mitzvah, my parents’ wedding, brides and baby namings for my brothers and me, my siblings and my Bar and Bat Mitzvahs, my wedding and, as soon as the Temple reopens, Isabelle’s baby naming. By standing on the bimah during the concluding service of the most holy day of the year, I like to think that we are carrying on the Shack family legacy at the Temple and that we are looking ahead to all of our future milestones.

As all of the children approach the bimah and raise their hands to the candle that my brother David is raising high overhead during the Havdalah, I feel a sense of pride and excitement to raise the next generation of Shacks – the fifth generation of Shacks – as a part of our Temple Emanuel family.

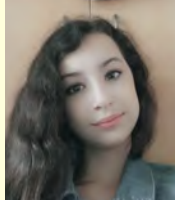

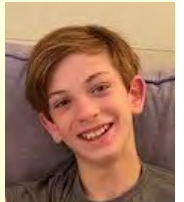

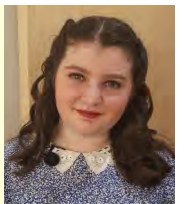

Elisha ben Abuyah said: He who learns when a child, to what is he compared? To ink written upon a new writing sheet. And he who learns when an old man, to what is he compared? To ink written on a rubbed writing sheet. (Pirkei Avot 4:20)

Jewish law obligates the community to provide accessible education to its young people. As early as two thousand years ago, Jewish communities endeavored to establish systems of universal male schooling. Whether one was the son of a merchant or a farmer, the community offered him access to a basic education. Of course, we are disturbed by our ancestors' exclusion of young women and girls, but by the standards of antiquity, this was an exceptionally egalitarian policy that expressed the importance of education to Jewish communal life. For millennia, Jewish civilization has committed itself to educating the individual in order to shape and strengthen the community at large.

Elisha ben Abuyah's teaching supports this claim with a rich and surprising metaphor. We have come to think of education as the process by which lessons are impressed upon young people, by which knowledge is inscribed upon their hearts and minds. While this may be true in certain cases, we offer a different understanding of education when we compare the student to ink. It suggests when a young person learns, they create something new—they are the ink, not the paper. By learning, the child becomes poised to make their mark. By providing the child with access to education, the community becomes like a fresh writing sheet.

From the Jewish perspective, we educate our children so that they will develop the capacity to change the world around them. An education is not something that a person “gets,” it is a creative process that a person takes on whenever they learn something new. This process is ongoing and should, according to Elisha ben Abuyah, last a lifetime. Our elders are capable of becoming ink just as our young people are. The difference is that their writing sheet is described as “rubbed.” This could mean that this sheet has been through many edits and erasures, or simply that it is worn and well-loved. Either way, we see that at all stages of life, individuals have the capacity to shape their community through study.

We also see, however, that there are educational opportunities that are unique to childhood: To see the world as a blank slate, brimming with potential. To be able to explore and experiment, try and fail. To see yourself as an individual with the power to make social change, to begin to understand that your community depends upon you. To make the astonishing discovery that you are but a drop in a whole sea of ink, that you belong to a long line of learners.

With the start of the school year upon us, I have hope that communities will come together to determine a course of action that will protect the health and wellbeing of students, teachers and staff.

There are numerous, serious factors to take into account when considering whether to adopt in-person teaching, remote learning or a hybrid of the two. Among these, however, should be our Jewish communal obligations.

Are we providing children with equal access to education? Are we providing an education that will allow them to be like ink, to see the world as a fresh canvas, and make their mark on the world around them? And are we preparing students for what should be a lifelong process of investigation, discovery and revision?

This is, of course, only the beginning of a conversation about Judaism, education and the wisdom of Elisha ben Abuya. This is also only the first installment of an ongoing project. In the coming months, I plan to bring relevant excerpts from *Pirkei Avot* to the Temple Bulletin. As I do, I encourage you to share your questions, comments, perspectives and interpretations. The first opportunity to join the conversation will be at our first Zoom Beit Midrash on October 8. 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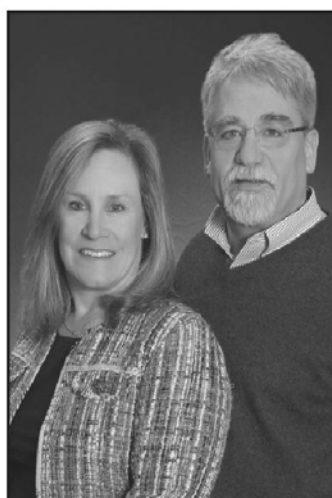
