Cantor's Column

An Interview with Cantor Rachel:

"These are a Few of my Favorite Things" (with props to one of my favorite musical theatre composer duos Rogers and Hammerstein)

Shalom Friends! I am honored and privileged to begin serving the Temple Emanuel community as your new Cantor. As I was preparing to begin my partnership with all of you, I was asked a series of questions to answer as a way for my new Temple family to get to know me. There seemed to be a running theme for many of the questions about what some of my favorite things were, so I thought I'd start with these questions.

What is your favorite thing about being a Cantor? Why?

What I love most about being a Cantor is being a part of people's lives as they journey through the life cycles of their lives. It brings me such joy to join in celebration with my congregants as they celebrate the most meaningful moments in their lives, from the birth of a baby, to partnering with students as they become B'nai Mitzvah and celebrating with couples as they join together in marriage. I am also deeply humbled when I can be present for and help bring peace to people when they are sick and comfort to those who are nearing the end of their lives. It is truly the greatest honor to be called upon to support families as they grieve the loss of a loved one. It is a privilege to be present for people in times of great joy and deep sorrow.

Do you have a favorite prayer? Which one and Why?

My favorite prayer is Hashkiveynu. Hashkiveynu is a prayer recited or sung in both the weekday and Shabbat liturgy in the evening. It asks God to shelter us in peace, to watch over and guard us in the evening when we rest and restore us to life in the morning. I liken the prayer to a lullaby we sing before we go to sleep. Many of the musical settings for Hashkiveynu are calming, peaceful, in keeping with a soothing lullaby. I look forward to sharing many beautiful Hashkiveynu melodies with you in our worship together.

What is your favorite verse or book from the Tanach and why?

My favorite book from the Tanach (the books of the Torah, Prophets/Nevi'im and Writing/Ketuvim) is Song of Songs/ Shir HaShirim. It is a book of love poetry composed by King Solomon. It is considered one of our Megilot and it is the Haftarah that is chanted during the week of Passover. Some Rabbinic sages suggest the poetry describes King Solomon's relationship with God. Others say they are love poems for his lovers. My own personal interpretation is that it is both and depends on the context of the verses. Why is this my favorite book in the Tanach? Well, for one, I'm a huge romantic and those who know me well say that I am a very passionate person with a big heart. But, honestly, who doesn't like love poems and love songs? Who wouldn't want What are your favorite musical styles? someone to write something so beautiful for them. I rest my case!

Who are some of your favorite musicians, both secular and Jewish?

I'll start with my favorite Jewish musicians. I know it seems obvious and predictable, but Debbie Friedman is on the top of my list, and I'll tell you why. I grew up in a Conservative Jewish family and was not really familiar with Debbie's music growing up. My first

real introduction to her music was when my family began attending services at and connecting with a Reform congregation. Debbie's music opened up a whole new world of Jewish liturgical music for me and resonated so deeply with me in a way I had never felt before. Once that gate opened, I began exploring, listening to and singing the music of every contemporary Jewish musician I could find. And, of course, my newest favorite Jewish musician is my son Ian Simpson and his musical partner Jeremy Sipe who will be recording their first album of Jewish music this fall! Their band name: Double Chai...perfect!

As far as secular musicians, my favorite music and bands can be broken down into 3 categories: music of my childhood, songs of my teens and twenties and music that connects me as an adult to my kids.

#1 always was and will be The Beatles. When I was a little girl, my Papa would bring me Beatles albums when he and my Grammie came to visit. I credit the Beatles for teaching me how to sing, especially harmonies! Of course, I love all the Beatles, but my first love is Paul McCartney. He's mine, ladies! And, yes, my husband is aware of my devotion to Paul. I have a soft spot for the British!

#2 U2. I have been to every concert tour U2 has had in Boston since 1984, with the exception of one....when they came during the High Holy Days. Why Bono didn't get the memo that they're timing didn't work for me, I don't know. I am almost as much of a die hard U2 fan as I am a Paul McCartney fan. U2 defines the 80's and 90's for me.

#3 Coldplay. When looking for contemporary music that I could relate to with my children, I started to tune into Coldplay. Coldplay's earlier music was reminiscent of U2, but appealed to a younger generation. They shifted styles and sounds over the years, but I'm getting into their pop-y, dance music now...it's great road trip music. And, again, my newest favorite rock band is Sons Lunaris, my older son Alex Simpson's 70's inspired rock group. His album will drop later this year as well!

Before you think me strictly a rock and roll girl, I have to say the other major influence on me as a child was musical

theatre. That's the other genre of music my Papa gave me albums of as a child. I am a huge musical theatre fan and see just about every musical that tours and try to make an annual pilgrimage to New York to see new shows. I like everything from the classics to the contemporary.

I also love classical music and attend many classical concerts as well annually. The last concert I saw was Yitzchak Perlman, who I especially loved, as he is not only a treasure for being a violin virtuoso but having a delightful sense of humor! My favorite classical composer is Bach. Vivaldi is a close second.

Speaking of classics, I love classic rock from the 60's and 70's....just about everything. And, sadly, the only genres of music I can't get into are country music and opera. Sorry, Met Opera fans...I've tried. Country, I haven't really tried. The only country music I like is Jewish country artist Joe Buchanan and Jewish bluegrass band Nefesh Mountain. Yes, Jewish country music does exist!


Sisterhood

Every news broadcast and social media channel bombards us daily with the challenges people face - hunger, discrimination close to home, disenfranchised voters, gun violence, the war in Ukraine...the list goes on. The Social Action - Social Justice Committee expanded its focus this year to promote justice locally.

The Board of Governors engaged in the ADL's program on "Implicit Bias" in January which provided a springboard for further discussion to benefit the temple community.

In April and May, the SA-SJ committee and our 9th grade confirmation students participated in three discussion sessions regarding food insecurity and basic needs, aging and supporting our elder community, the Ukraine and how we can help the refugees. Each discussion was followed up with an activity: grab 'n go lunches, letter writing and potting plants, and resources for refugees. Next year we will expand this joint effort with the Religious School on a monthly basis and are excited to promote Social Action-Social Justice in our youth.

In May we were delighted to return in person to serve at **Bread & Roses** and are seeking 2-3 new volunteers. A special thanks to Judy Matulsky and her sub-committee of Temple employees (Barbara, Beth, Betsy, Elissa, Janice & Sue) who will be preparing the macaroni & cheese on the Monday before we serve on Tuesday.

The committee continues to send a bereavement package through **Grandma's Chicken Soup** to congregant families in mourning.

The **Scholarship Committee** was delighted to award 7 scholarships to outstanding students in Lawrence towards their college careers.

Affordable housing provides an opportunity for a family to enjoy the tremendous local opportunities so many of us

enjoy: good schools, excellent libraries and family-friendly parks. Thanks to our team of hammer-wielding volunteers on June 12th for joining **Habitat for Humanity's "Day That Faith Built".** Who knew that caulking and installing windows and flashing or weeding could be such fun? Be on the look-out for our next building event in the Fall. No previous experience needed!

Re-SOUL-lutions A New Prayerbook for the New Year

We're excited to share that when we gather this fall for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, we'll be welcoming a new member of our community: a new prayerbook. Over this past year, our Ritual Committee met several times to discuss adopting Mishkan HaNefesh, the updated Reform movement prayer books for our High Holiday services, and earlier this spring, without objection, the committee voted to do so. The Executive Committee and Board of Governors supported this recommendation as well.

These prayerbooks will already feel quite familiar to our congregation. The layout is the same as the prayerbook we use on Friday nights, Mishkan Tefillah, and over the past several years, both Rabbi Goldstein and Rabbi Chaiken have used excerpts from this prayer book at our High Holiday services. These *machzorim* (high holiday prayerbooks) were first published and released around seven years ago, and there are a number of benefits to adopting them. They maintain the liturgy and Hebrew of the High Holiday prayers that mean so much to us, while also offering a contemporary approach to translation, gender, theology, and scholarship. They also include *transliteration* (the Hebrew prayers written in English characters) for every prayer, which will help our services be more inclusive.

Since its release, Mishkan HaNefesh has been adopted by 80% of Reform congregations, and has become the standard Machzor for the Reform movement. We are

In August, Rabbi Chaiken will hold three introductory workshops to allow our congregation to become familiar with the new machzor prior to the High Holy Days. These workshops will give you a chance to take a look at a copy in advance, and reflect on some of the beautiful translations and poetry included in them.

Those workshops will take place on:

- Sunday, August 21 at 12:30 PM in our Social Hall and on 700m
- Wednesday, August 24 at 7:00 PM on Zoom only
