We are eagerly anticipating the Jewish New Year, 5783, and we are excited to connect, gather, and pray together with all of you!

Our services will combine the familiar with the new, honoring our traditions, connecting us to our ancestors, and looking to the bright future of our Temple Emanuel community. Our services will be conducted by Rabbi Max Chaiken and Cantor Rachel Reef-Simpson, alongside a team of talented, professional musicians and our choir.



This year we are also excited to introduce *Mishkan HaNefesh*, the Reform Movement's new machzor (or prayerbook) for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. As you may have read, our Ritual Committee, led by Sam Gerber, and our Board of Governors has voted to adopt these prayerbooks this year, and we know that they will bring profound meaning and beauty to our holidays. The format of this prayerbook will already feel familiar, as we have used the companion book on Friday nights for many years, and we have also used some of the interpretive readings during the high holidays over the past two years. For those who are interested in becoming even more familiar with *Mishkan HaNefesh*, you are welcome to join our workshops led by Rabbi Chaiken later this month.

Finally, as we continue living with the COVID-19 Pandemic, we will continue to accommodate those who wish to join us remotely. All of our services will be accessible via Zoom in a fashion similar to the setup we use for our weekly shabbat evening services, with access links that will be available to members and ticketed guests.

Selichot—Night of Reflection, Song, and Prayer

Selichot, Saturday, September 17 at 7:00 pm

Join Rabbi Max Chaiken and Cantor Rachel Reef-Simpson for an evening of reflection, song, and prayer in preparation for the High Holy Days. Selichot represents the official "start" of our Holy Day season, and a first formal opportunity to begin the work of teshuvah, repentance, that continues throughout our sacred season.

Tashlich—Casting Away

Rosh Hashanah, Monday, September 26 at 4:30pm

Join Rabbi Max Chaiken and Cantor Rachel Reef-Simpson for this annual chance to symbolically cast off our misdeeds as we seek a fresh start for our Jewish new year. This short, ancient ritual gives us an opportunity to gather outdoors, reflect on ways we have missed the mark, and let go of that which holds us back.

Services for Families with Young Children

CONCURRENT CHILDREN'S PROGRAMMING

Our concurrent program will be available this year exclusively **during the early services** on the first day of Rosh Hashanah (September 26), Kol Nidre (October 4) and Yom Kippur (October 5). This program will include a musical service component, holiday themed story time and activities, and gross motor play (outdoor weather permitting). These programs will be available to children ages 4 through grade 3.

Capacity will be limited, so families who wish to have their children participate in these programs must RSVP as soon as possible. Please note that once we reach capacity, we will not be able to accommodate additional or walk-in registrations.



RE-SOUL-UTIONS:

A New Prayerbook for the New Year

We're excited to welcome a new member of our community: a new prayerbook. Over this past year, our Ritual Committee met several times to discuss adopting *Mishkan HaNefesh*, the updated Reform movement prayerbooks for our High Holiday services, and earlier this spring, without objection, the committee voted to do so. The Executive Committee and Board of Governors supported this recommendation as well.

These prayerbooks will already feel quite familiar to you. The layout is the same as the prayerbook we use on Friday nights, *Mishkan Tefillah*, and over the past several years, both Rabbi Goldstein and Rabbi Chaiken have used excerpts from this prayer book at our High Holiday services. These *machzorim* (high holiday prayerbooks) were first published and released seven years ago, and there are a number of benefits to adopting them. They maintain the liturgy and Hebrew of the High Holiday prayers that mean so much to us, while also offering a contemporary approach to translation, gender, theology, and scholarship. They also include transliteration (the Hebrew prayers written in English characters) for every prayer, which will help our services be more inclusive.

Since its release, *Mishkan HaNefesh* has been adopted by 80% of Reform congregations, and has become the standard Machzor for the Reform movement. We are looking forward to this meaningful advancement for our community.

This month, Rabbi Chaiken will hold three introductory workshops to allow our congregation to become familiar with the new machzor prior to the High Holy Days. These workshops will give you a chance to take a look at a copy in advance, and reflect on some of the beautiful translations and poetry included in them.

Those workshops will take place on:

- Sunday, August 21 at 12:30 PM in our Social Hall and on Zoom
- Wednesday, August 24 at 7:00 PM on Zoom only
- Thursday, September 1 at 10:30 AM in our Social Hall and on Zoom

If you are planning to attend, please visit our website to RSVP and let us know!

Finally, for those who are interested, you may also contact the Main Office to borrow a copy for a short period of time this summer, and the books may also be purchased as Kindle Books on Amazon or through the CCAR press if you'd like your own copy.

We hope that *Mishkan HaNefesh* will help us maintain our traditions, connect to our holidays in new ways, and bring in the Jewish new year meaningfully and joyfully for years to come.





POLICIES

Tickets

All members must be in good standing in order to receive or purchase High Holy Day Access. To be considered in good standing, all past years' dues and fees must be paid in full and the first payment for the current fiscal year must be paid. If the timeliness of payments is a concern and/or you need to request a confidential adjustment of your membership commitment, please contact our Executive Director, Maureen Chapman at mchapman@templeemanuel.net, to make arrangements. All adjustments must be made prior to the start of the High Holy Days.

Participation in the Temple Emanuel Benefactors' Society includes additional High Holy Day Guest Access.

In-Person Guest Access may be purchased for additional family members (i.e. single adult children, parents, married children and out-of-town guests). Guest Access is **\$180 per person** for all In-Person High Holy Day Services.

Virtual-Only Guest Access for additional family members is **\$180 per household** and includes Virtual Access to all of our virtual services.

In Person Guest Access is sold to non-member families who are new to the area. The cost of Guest Access will be applied towards dues if the family becomes a Temple member during the fiscal year. The cost of this access is \$360 per person. Guest Access allows attendance to all High Holiday Services.

College Students and Active Military Personnel

College students and active military personnel are welcome to worship with the congregation. Please contact Maureen Chapman, mchapman@templeemanuel.net to request complimentary Guest Access.

Reciprocity

Members in good standing who plan to be away for the High Holy Days may request reciprocity. Please let our office know if this applies to you so we may assist you in obtaining tickets for worship in any congregation affiliated with the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ).

Ushers

All ushering is performed by Temple Emanuel members. We have a wonderful corps of ushers led by the Brotherhood. We hope you will join our group of ushers in celebrating the holidays and performing this mitzvah. If you are interested in being an usher, please visit our website to sign up.

POLICIES

Seating

There is no reserved seating for our congregants. In consideration of your fellow congregants, we ask that you do not save seats. Thank you.

Parking

Our custodians will be on hand to facilitate the flow of traffic. Traffic ENTERING the Temple MUST do so from Bellevue by turning right into the driveway. Traffic EXITING the Temple MUST do so by taking a RIGHT onto Haggetts Pond Road. Should you choose to park on the road for services, please be mindful not to block the roadway or residential driveways.

Handicapped Parking

Temple Emanuel makes every effort to accommodate members with special needs. We have designated the side driveway (near the kitchen entrance) as Handicapped Parking Only.


