In one of the pivotal scenes from the Book of Esther, Mordechai and his niece, the new Queen Esther are sending messages back and forth after hearing about the wicked Haman's evil plan to harm the Jews. He urges her not to stay silent, and concludes with the phrase above. On my office wall hangs a piece of art I was given with an interpretation of this quote, but instead of the literal translation, it reads the following in English:

"Perhaps this is the moment for which you were created!"

As we approach our celebrations of Purim and Passover this spring, this passage reminds me that we, too, can summon the same bravery and determination that our ancestors used to persevere through difficult times. 

With that in mind, we have a busy spring planned beginning this first week of March!

On Sunday, March 5th at 9:00 a.m. and Friday, March 10th at 6:30 p.m. we will gather together in celebration of Purim with our Purim Musical: "A Les Miz Purim Shpiel." 

A Guide to Passover

Passover, or Pesach, which begins on the fourteenth of the Hebrew month of Nisan, begins this year on Wednesday evening, April 5. Our Festival of Freedom lasts for seven days, commemorating the Exodus from Egypt. In the Torah it is designated by several names: Chag Haaviv (Deuteronomy 16:1), the Spring Festival; Chag HaMatzot (Exodus 12:20), the Festival of Matzah, and Chag HaPesach, the Festival of the Paschal Lamb.

Our current Pesach observance has evolved over centuries and brings together elements of the agricultural and pastoral origins of the festival as we celebrate the liberation of the Jewish people from Egyptian bondage.

The highlight of Pesach observance is the *Seder*, which means "order," a ritual meal with symbolic foods and a unique liturgy. The *Haggadah* helps us lead the *Seder*, retelling the story of our redemption from slavery, and helping us commit to work for freedom in our world today. As "the season of our liberation," Pesach reminds us of our responsibility to those who are oppressed or enslaved today—physically, intellectually, or ideologically. The experience of redemption in the Passover celebration should inspire all Jews to assist in the future redemption of humanity.

There are many *mitzvot* (sacred obligations) of Passover, and we hope that the following helps remind you of some of these customs:

The Mitzvah of Removing Leaven (*chametz***)** It is a mitzvah to remove leaven from one's home prior to the beginning of Pesach, and to refrain from eating any leavened products throughout the festival. Leaven refers to products made from wheat, barley, rye, oats and spelt, which have been permitted to rise. Some Ashkenazi Jews maintain the custom to include rice, millet, corn, and legumes (peas, beans).

The removal of leaven is based on the Biblical injunction found in Exodus 12:15: "On the very first day you shall remove leaven from your house." Those who do not actually remove all the leaven from one's home should place it in a closet or cabinet appropriately marked so that it will not be used during Pesach.

The Mitzvah of Preparing a Seder It is a mitzvah for everyone to participate in the preparations for the *Seder*—cooking, cleaning, and setting the festive table. The leader of the *Seder* also typically reviews the *Haggadah*, or *Haggadot*, in advance, planning which passages will be included and how the ritual meal will be conducted to include all those in attendance. In addition, the tradition encourages the use of beautiful ritual items to increase our enjoyment of the mitzvot.

We are planning a Community Second Night *Seder* led by Rabbi Chaiken and Cantor Rachel at Temple Emanuel on Thursday, April 6 at 6:00PM – we hope you will join us! (RSVP required - see back of bulletin for information!)

The Mitzvah of Hospitality

It is a mitzvah to invite guests to join in the Seder. We even include in the text of the *Haggadah*, "Let all who are hungry come and eat, let all who are in want share the hope of Passover." We work to ensure that all who wish to celebrate Passover can do so in community.

The Mitzvah of Tzedakah (Charity)

It is a mitzvah to give Tzedakah before Passover. Tradition encourages the solicitation of special funds to provide food for those in need.

The Haggadah

There are many different Haggadot used to recall the Exodus from Egypt. The diversity of customs and practices helps to make each Seder unique. One of the central ideas teaches that each of us should look upon ourselves as having personally experienced the Exodus. "In every generation, each of us should feel as though we ourselves had gone forth from Egypt, as it is written: And you shall explain to your child on that day, it is because of what the Eternal did for me when I, myself, went forth from Egypt."

The Seder Plate

A Seder Plate holds the symbolic foods that help us recall our journey from slavery to freedom. It includes: **Zeroa**, a roasted shank bone burned or scorched, representing the ancient Passover sacrifice; **Karpas**, parsley or green vegetable, symbolizing springtime, hope and renewal; **Maror**, bitter herbs, often horseradish root, symbolic of the bitterness that our ancestors experienced in Egypt and, in a contemporary sense, the lot of all who are enslaved; **Charoset**, a dish often made from fruit and nuts, representing the mortar which our ancestors used to make bricks for Pharaoh; **Beitzah**, or a roasted egg, representing the **Chagigah** or festival offering, and a symbol of life itself; **Chazeret**, another bitter herb like romaine lettuce, in addition to the maror. We also place **three separate pieces of Matzah** on the table—two pieces that represent the two traditional loaves (**Lechem Mishneh**) set out in the ancient Temple during Sabbaths and Festivals, and a third matzah symbolic of Passover.

We fill **Elijah's cup**, a special glass of wine or juice for Elijah the Prophet, and we traditionally open the door for Elijah's presence at the end of the seder, with hope that our world will be redeemed in the year to come with the help of the prophet who heralds redemption.

Additions to the Plate: In recent decades, many Reform and liberal communities have included additional items on the seder plate to represent some of the freedoms we still seek to bring to the world. **Miriam's cup** is filled with water, honoring the role of women in our deliverance from Egypt and throughout Jewish history, and representing her role bringing water throughout the Israelites' journey in the desert. An **orange** represents the inclusion of LGBTQ+ Jews in Jewish life.

The Mitzvah of Eating Matzah (Unleavened Bread)

It is a mitzvah to eat matzah at the *Seder* and to recite the appropriate blessings. (See *Haggadah*). By eating Matzah, we recall that the dough prepared by our people had no time to rise before the final act of redemption. "And they baked unleavened cakes of the dough since they had been driven out of Egypt and could not delay, nor had they prepared provisions for themselves."

The Mitzvah of Four Cups

It is a mitzvah to drink four cups of wine or grape juice during the *Seder*, each of which recalls one of God's four promises of redemption from bondage made to our ancestors. Some follow the custom of adding a fifth cup, representing the connection to the promised land.

The Four Questions

It is customary for the youngest participant(s) to recite the Four Questions, found in the Haggadah. This traditional text shares four answers to the question "what makes tonight different than all other nights?" And the answers note four unusual features of the Seder meal: eating only matzah, dipping foods, eating bitter herbs, and reclining using pillows.

Afikomen

After breaking a piece of Matzah early in the Seder, we set aside half as the Afikomen, the official "dessert" of the meal. According to one tradition, the meal cannot end until all had tasted of the Afikomen. In connection with this, a practice developed of hiding the Afikomen and having the children search for it. Sometime during the meal, the leader hides the Afikomen, trying to elude the watchful observance of the children, whose endeavor it is to search out its hiding place. Prizes might be awarded to all who participate, with a special gift to the one who finds it. In some households it is the custom for children to "steal" the Afikomen to hide it, and hold it for "ransom", since the meal cannot conclude without it.

Yizkor

It is a mitzvah to recite Yizkor, or memorial prayers, on the seventh day of Pesach. Our memorial service this year will be the evening of **Thursday, April 11, at 6:00 PM** – the evening which begins the 7th night of Passover. Yizkor memorializes our relatives and our own friends, as well as the martyrs of our generation and previous generations.



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
