CANTOR'S MESSAGE

Monarch On A Beach

I'd like to tell you that this story is all about me, the monarch on the beach, but despite having French nobility in my blood seven generations back, I am just the witness to this tale. The true protagonist is a monarch butterfly.

A few days ago, I saw a lone, magnificent monarch butterfly flying near me at the beach. It was displaying its bright orange colors in the sunlight, accented by and framed in black and a little bit of white. It was so unusual that I literally did a double take. It's not that I don't see butterflies on the beach, but this was the third week in October! When I got home, I looked up some facts as well as some fascinating symbolism about the monarch butterfly.

One interesting thing I learned is that, unlike monarchs the rest of the year who only live two to six weeks, the fall monarchs, or what naturalists call the "last generation of the year" live up to eight or nine months. Honestly, I didn't think they could survive the colder temperatures at night, but apparently it helps them live longer.

The monarch butterfly, in many cultures, symbolizes transformation and resilience; opportunities to shed our old selves and embrace new beginnings. Because the monarch flies thousands of miles as it migrates south away from the cold, it is also a symbol of strength in adversity and perseverance.

In Mexican culture, the monarch butterfly connects the departed with their living loved ones and is a beautiful reminder that death never severs those bonds. Many cultures also believe that the sighting of a monarch butterfly is a good omen, bringing with it a message to embrace change and an opportunity for evolution.

I thought it so very fitting that during this season and during these High Holy Days, the ultimate time for renewal and personal growth, I would see a monarch butterfly. It reminded me of the suggestion I made to all of you, my Temple family, a little while back in a previous article; to always look for the miracles on your journey, whether they are in nature, as this one was, or a human encounter, or something remarkable that happens in your day. And, seeing the monarch butterfly also made me recall something that Rabbi Wilfond shared in his Yom Kippur morning sermon: take the time to be grateful and, if you can, keep a gratitude journal. I have to admit, on the day I saw the butterfly, I was feeling very stressed and not particularly grateful. But that sighting gave me pause, and I stopped what I was doing, acknowledged the miracle in the sighting and my attitude for the remainder of the day changed completely. Instead of being mired by my worries, I felt grateful...and see, I'm writing it down too!

I hope that, as you launch into this new year, your journey of renewal is a positive and fulfilling one, you take the time to look for and find the miracles, great and small, and acknowledge your gratitude. It can be as transformative as a monarch butterfly!

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

BENEFACTORS SOCIETY: GROWTH AND IMPACT



Did you know that temple membership dues and fees do not fully cover our annual operating expenses? As many synagogues and most nonprofits do, we turn to our members to help close this gap through the Temple Emanuel Benefactors Society. And our congregants have stepped up to answer the call!



Since our Benefactors Society was re-launched in 2023, the program has experienced steadfast growth due to the extraordinary response from thoughtful and generous congregants who chose to become Benefactors with contributions above their regular dues. As of September 30, 76 Benefactors – including 17 who have joined for the first time – have contributed an additional \$66,500 to the bottom line of our operating budget.

All revenue raised from Benefactors is used to help fund the temple's annual operating expenses, thereby having a direct and immediate impact on nearly every aspect of temple life: making

membership accessible to all; offering innovative, relevant and meaningful programming; and enabling us to be nimble and ready to meet the moment.

Designed to offer access and inclusivity, the entry level donation is \$180. While many congregants make gifts at this level, contributions are made at all levels. The Benefactors Society engages the diversity of our membership and demonstrates that sustaining a strong, vibrant Temple Emanuel is our shared responsibility.




We could not be more thrilled that Rebecca and Josh are now married, and as an added bonus, it has unified the Noymer and Matulsky families.

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
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
