RABBI'S MESSAGE

Have you ever wondered what is the question rabbis are most frequently asked? In my experience, the most asked question is, "What should we name the baby?" Many families know the exact name they want in English but ask for help with finding the right Hebrew or Jewish name.

Names are very important in Judaism. In the Bible, it says, "A good name is more important than riches." (Proverbs 22.1) Jewish names have meanings. For example, Isaac means laughter in Hebrew. A name can be a prayer: May this child be filled with laughter and be an Isaac. A name can represent a partnership between God and the child. For example, the name Eliora means God's light. It reflects how God's light can enter the world through human beings. A name can give a sense of mission. Raphael means God heals. This might give a person named Raphael the mission to bring healing into the world.

A very common Ashkenazi minhag, a custom of Jews from Europe, is to keep alive the memory of a deceased family member by passing the name to the next generation. Among Sephardic Jews, it is considered a great honor to have a child or grandchild named after you while you are still alive.

Not every Jewish person has a Jewish name. There are a million possible reasons why someone might never have received a Jewish name. There is a custom in many synagogues that if a person never received a Jewish name and would like one, a ceremony is held on the week of *Parashat Shemot* (the Torah portion of names) and a Jewish name is given. *Shemot* means names. It begins the Book of Exodus with a list of 70 names of Jacob's family who went to live in Egypt during a time of famine in the Land of Israel.

This year, the Torah portion of Names falls on Friday, January 17. If you or your child never received a Jewish name, I invite you to the Temple on January 17 for a brief naming ceremony that will occur within our Shabbat service and receive a Jewish Name certificate.



Right Time - Right Cookie.

Have you ever had an experience when you've been in the right place at the right time? Or perhaps, someone you didn't know ended up being your angel here on this earth at just the right moment. Recently, I had a day when God put me in just that place at that time. When I'm home in Maine, I try to go to the beach once a week. At this time of year, it may be just to sit for a moment and stare at the ocean and breathe. But often in these winter months, I'm not such a shtarker (bigshot), as my Grammie used to say. The wind off the water can make it brutally cold. So sometimes I just grab a sandwich and sit in my car in the parking lot of Ogunquit Beach, Perkins Cove or Long Sands Beach.

On this particular Monday, I was a little lazy and picked up a sandwich and drink at the market in downtown Ogunquit. As I was waiting in line to check out, sort of like the candy shelves at the grocery store check out, I may have gotten tempted by a very large s'mores cookie the

size of my head. Honestly, who needs a cookie that big? But, wondering what a s'mores cookie tasted like, I purchased it. I had every intention of sitting on the beach that day. However, I quickly realized it was far too windy and, though I had a sweatshirt, I neglected to bring a coat, so I stayed in my car for my solo picnic.

Not 10 minutes later, I heard what sounded like high-pitched screaming on the other side of the lot. Not someone shouting for help, but actual screaming and crying from a child. A large camper van two spots over was blocking my view, so I couldn't see anyone coming up from the beach. Initially, I was a bit annoyed that I came for 10 minutes of peace, and it was being disturbed. When it didn't stop after a few minutes, I got concerned. And then I saw them. This young woman was walking to her car parked beside me, struggling to carry an adorable, and flailing, three year old boy, who was soaking wet, very pink and screaming his guts out.

At first, I tried to channel my husband Phil and thought "OK, not my business." I also tried not to judge but was thinking, "Oy...this kid must have fallen in the water while he was walking on the beach with his mom; he must be freezing. Maybe not the best choice for them to be out there." I couldn't help but look in their direction, as this woman attempted to grab a change of clothes and undress and redress this child while he continued to throw a fit, physically and emotionally.

Just then, I had what Oprah Winfrey calls an "aha moment." And, if you know me at all, you know Mama Bear can't keep to herself. Suddenly, I realized why I was compelled to buy that enormous cookie (other than it looked delicious, and I had no will power) I rolled down my window while the woman was changing her screaming child beside me and said, "I have this large cookie. See, it's still wrapped. Can I give him a piece of this cookie?" I then stepped out of the car.

The woman answered, "He's autistic and can't speak. I am his social worker. I take him out a few times a week to give his mom a break. He loves coming to the beach and playing in the puddles, but he hates leaving and pitches a fit." Then I unwrapped the cookie, bent down to the boy, still screaming in his car seat, and handed him a third of the cookie. I rubbed his little pink feet to warm them while he took his first bites through muffled cries, and he started to calm down. I talked to him a bit, asking him if it was a good cookie. I then stood up, broke off another third of the cookie and handed it to the woman, telling her, "I think you need a piece of this, too." She took the piece from me and said, "You're a godsend. You don't know how much this means. Thank you."

Always buy the cookie!


SHABBAT SHIRAH SERVICE - THE SABBATH OF SONG


