RABBI'S MESSAGE



Rabbi David Wilfond

In a few weeks at Passover, many of us will raise a glass and say, “*Next year in Jerusalem.*” Why wait until next year? We can already experience the sweet taste of Israel this year by drinking Israeli wine for at least one of the four cups. Serving Israeli wine at your seder is not only delicious, but it can also strengthen Jewish identity and help the economy of Israel.

During the 400 years that the Ottoman Turks ruled over the Land of Israel from 1517 to 1917, virtually all the vineyards were uprooted and destroyed in accordance with Muslim law that prohibits the consumption of wine. The Jewish French Baron, Edmond Rothchild, is credited with reintroducing winemaking to the Land of Israel. In the late 1800s, during the waning years of the Ottoman Empire, Jewish farmers planted grapes on Mount Carmel. *Carmel* is an ancient Hebrew word that means “*vineyard of God.*” The modern Jewish pioneers (*kibbutzniks*) had an inkling that a place called the “*vineyard of God*” might be a good place to grow grapes and make wine. This is how Israel’s first modern winery, Carmel Wines, was born. Today, there are hundreds of world-class wineries in Israel making delicious wines. My favorite are the wines

grown in the volcanic soils of the Golan Heights.

Sometimes, near the end of the seder, people get tired of drinking wine before we get to the last cup. So how do we get people to drink a fourth cup? A modern Israeli custom is to serve Champagne for the last cup. This gives us something special to look forward to. The Champagne bubbles that are ever moving upward can symbolize hope in the Jewish soul, which can never be pushed down and always strives to rise up.

What about the magic cup for Elijah? This cup represents the mitzvah of social responsibility to take care of “*the stranger, the orphan and the widow,*” as well as the poor, the vulnerable and the marginalized. In Jerusalem, it is common to pass around an empty Elijah’s cup so all present can pour some of their own wine into Elijah’s cup symbolizing that we all need to give of ourselves to repair the world. This is a chance for us to articulate what we will do to bring freedom into our world.

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The Sisterhood of Temple Emanuel sponsors the mailing of this bi-monthly bulletin.

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We are blessed to live in a generation in which wine from Israel is not a dream and can be found at the wine shop in Andover, or an even greater Israeli wine selection can be found in Brookline. I hope you will consider getting some Israeli wine to add a new dimension to your seder.

My family is looking forward to celebrating with you at our congregation's second seder. Together we may lift high the *cup of freedom*.

L'Chayim, to life!

CANTOR'S MESSAGE



Finding Hope

As I sit down to write this message to you, this has been a dark time. Our country has been severely impacted by the worst wildfires in Los Angeles' history; two planes have crashed in just one week in the U.S. with no survivors and families and friends are left grieving. Many of us and our loved ones have been impacted by major changes being implemented in our country.

I have also equally been focused on all this while, at the same time, glued to the news of the hostages being released in Israel. I am so attached; it is as if the young women were my own daughters, and the men were my sons and brothers. Every day I pray, and each time I have a moment where I lose my breath in fear, in anger, and then I breathe again, a breath of calm and of hope. I continue to pray and to hope.

I think about how these hostages have survived the unthinkable for 15 months and believe it is the same thing: Hope.

Bishop Desmond Tutu of South Africa said this about hope:

“Hope is being able to see that there is light despite all of the darkness.”

Our people, our brothers and sisters, have literally been living through darkness, living through the unimaginable, not only today but throughout the centuries during the Holocaust, wars, pogroms, inquisitions and dating back to biblical times. We are not the only ones who have suffered but we've managed to survive. As such a small percentage of the world's population, how have we become so resilient? Again, I return to one word: Hope.

In Hebrew, the words “the hope” are Hatikvah. It is not a coincidence that the poem and song Hatikvah, originally composed by Zionists Naftali Imber and Samuel Cohen in 1878 and 1888, became the national anthem for the State of Israel. The second stanza reads:

“Our hope is not yet lost,
The hope of two millennia,
To be a free people in our land,
The land of Zion and Jerusalem.”

Though Hatikvah as a national anthem is focused on our hope to be free in our homeland, the underlying thread here is that we have hope...and that hope is not lost.

Jewish Singer/Songwriter Rick Recht's modern spin on the words are as follows:

“This is the hope that holds us together
Hatikvah, the hope that will last forever.
Hatikvah, the hope is still real.”

Hope is what holds us together, in our hearts as human beings, and in community as a Jewish people. To me, hope is the common thread. Hope is what keeps us going. It is as vital as the air we breathe. It is what helps us rise above.

That perches in the soul -
And sings the tune without the words -
And never stops - at all -“

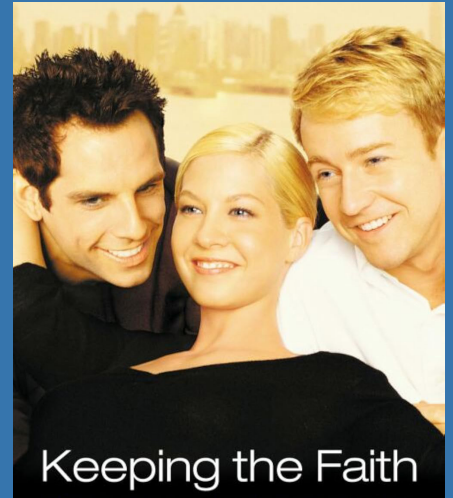

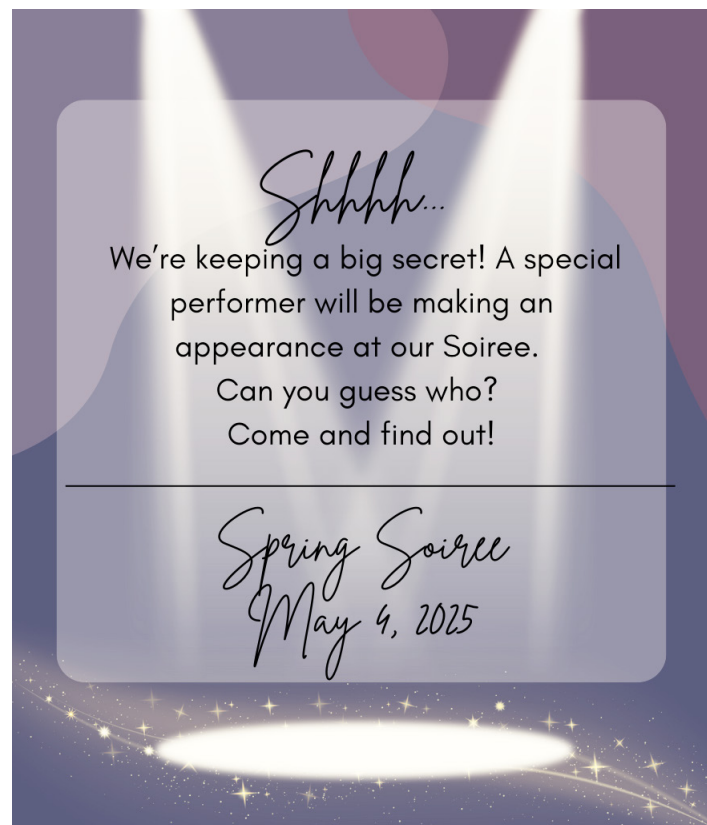
