RABBI'S MESSAGE



Rabbi David Wilfond

Installation was a celebration of hope. Many of you asked for a copy of my words. Here is a short version: In Hebrew, the word for thanks is "Todah." It comes from the same root as the word Yehudi, to be a Jew. The teaching is: to be a Jew is to be one who gives thanks. In this spirit I want to thank my wife, Deborah, and our children. I also want to thank Rabbi Goldstein and Rabbi Mates. To the brilliant president of our congregation, Dana Katz, the Executive Committee and the Board of Governors, our many volunteers and dedicated staff, thank you for your tireless devotion to this sacred community.

During the week of installation, we began a new book of the Torah, Leviticus. We also began a new chapter in the life of this congregation. In Hebrew, Leviticus is called Vayikra, which means "And God called." To be a rabbi is more than just a job. It is a calling.

To be a rabbi is to have a sense of mission to look after the welfare and vitality of a Jewish community and to engage the wider society with a Jewish voice in today's conversation about

where society is going. Our goal is to create an inclusive, loving and just society where all can live in freedom, and no one feels enslaved physically or spiritually.

The first word of Leviticus, Vayikra, means "and God called."

Vayikra is written in the Torah in an unusual manner. All the letters written in the scroll are in the same size, but the last letter, aleph, is always written in miniature. Why? Not only do the words of Torah carry meaning, but their size also carries meaning. I want to share some traditions about the little aleph.

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The Sisterhood of Temple Emanuel sponsors the mailing of this bi-monthly bulletin.

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One is about its sound. Aleph is magical in that it has no sound. Aleph is the sound of no sound, when we stop to think before we speak. How many times do we speak without thinking first? If you're like me, probably too often. The letter aleph reminds us to stop, pause and think before we speak.

Another teaching about the miniature aleph is that because it is silent, the word can be read in more than one way. If we let the aleph stand in silence and just let the other letters speak, Viyikra can be read Viyakar which means "dearly/ lovingly." The first verse of Leviticus can be read "And God spoke endearingly." This teaches us that the tone and tenor of how we speak is just as important as the words we choose.

Another teaching about the aleph is about humility. In Gamatria, all Hebrew letters have a numerical value. Aleph has the lowest value. It is only one. The message of humility is that we should not be arrogant and think we are more than anyone else. And we are not the only one to whom God speaks. God speaks to everyone, in a different way.

What does God want from us? Before you do something, ask yourself: Would God want to be your friend, if you do that? Live your life so God would want to be your friend. And ask yourself: Would God feel at home in your home if you do that? Make your home a place where God would feel at home in your home.

My dream and hope for our community is that we may create a place where God would feel at home in our home. The name Emanuel means "With us is God." God can be with everyone. May we make this a sacred community where God's presence is felt among us, in how we treat each other, and how we speak to each other.

Viyikra calls us to open a new chapter: a chapter of thinking before speaking, a chapter of sensitivity to tone and tenor, a chapter of humbleness as we create a community where God would feel at home.

It is a privilege to be your rabbi. The letter aleph also means the word to learn, as in Ulpan, a place of learning. My prayer is, may we learn from each other how to live and thrive as a sacred community. Amen.

One of the first things my late husband, Larry, and I did upon moving to Andover more than 50 years ago was search out a temple where our family, including three young daughters, could comfortably belong. Less than a month after our arrival, we attended Temple Emanuel's Friday night service in Lawrence where we were warmly greeted, despite our five-year-old falling asleep! Eight years later, this same daughter marched with her b'nai mitzvah class as they accompanied the Torahs to our new temple in Andover. All these years later, although they have moved away and joined other congregations, my daughters choose to come "home" to attend High Holiday services at "their" temple.

In the intervening years, connections to our temple have grown, changed and deepened. We celebrated the b'nai mitzvot and confirmations of all three daughters, first in Lawrence and then in Andover. Although we both worked, we made time to get involved in various committees and happily took advantage of opportunities to expand on our meager Jewish education. We joined the original Bread & Roses crew, and cooked and delivered the monthly meal and Yom Kippur collection for many years. Larry ran the blood drive and I chaired the Personnel Committee. Larry got involved with the Jewish movie night, eventually coordinating those evenings, a job that I proudly assumed since the Board of Governors honored his memory by naming it the Larry Hodes Jewish Film Series.

In all those years, we were aware of – and grateful to – those who preceded us who supported the temple financially and spiritually, ensuring that our building and our congregation were available for all who wanted and/or needed it, and the Jewish people would always have a home in the Greater Merrimack Valley.

I am now one of the "elders." SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

We had a very successful month of events in March and April.

Thank you to Judy Eskin for helping to bring important discussions to our Temple community. We also were able to have a special viewing of the film, *"Preconceived"* and discussion with the filmmaker. Judy who is co-Leader of Indivisible Mass Coalition and member of the Soul Sisters, facilitated and moderated a stimulating panel of experts on Reproductive Equity. Thank you for Dr. Andrea Polonsky, Andover obstetrician/gynecologist and congregant for sharing your knowledge, along with Atty. Carrie Baker, Smith College Professor of Gender and Women's Studies, Jennifer McKenna, an expert on crisis pregnancy centers; and Abby Fisher, co-chair of the Massachusetts chapter of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism. The panel explored the legal, medical and social landscape for reproductive rights in the wake of the Supreme Court's Dobbs decision and opportunities for advocacy.

We also hosted leaders of the International Institute of New England spoke about the current crisis for immigrants in the US and how IINE helps them. We heard a first-hand account by Sabira, an Afghan refugee of her family's struggle to reunite and her gratitude for the Jewish community who has supported her. This event was co-sponsored by South Church. Thank you for Karen Lipshires for making the connection to IINE.

June brings the following events:

On June 19 we are participating in the Andover Juneteenth Celebration from 4:00 to 7:00 pm. Temple Emanuel is again serving on the planning committee for the third year with representatives of South Church, Christ Church, the Andover Baptist Church, Merrimack Valley Black & Brown and the Town of Andover. 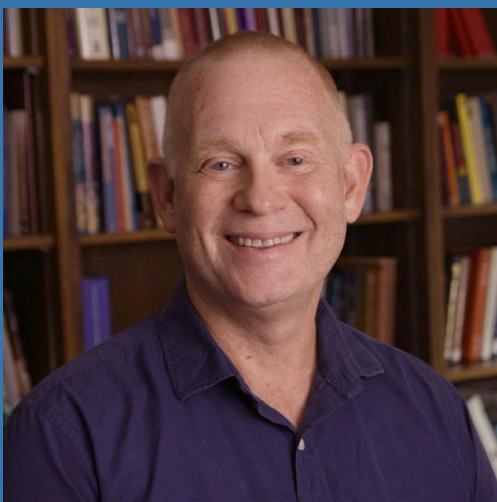
THANK YOU JUDY
