#### RABBI'S MESSAGE



#### Between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur

With deep sadness I share the news of my mother's passing during the Ten Days of Awe — the sacred days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, when our tradition teaches that every soul stands in judgment before God.

This year, just as we were concluding our congregation's annual cemetery service, the cell phone in my pocket began to buzz. It was my brother calling to tell me that our mother had just died. I stood among the gravestones with the words of El Malei Rachamim still hanging in the air. Moments later, I needed to drive to the Haverhill Cemetery to lead the next of our annual memorial services. It was not easy to stand before others so soon after hearing such news. A few days later, I led our Yom Kippur services and Yizkor, carrying tremendous personal sadness even as I sought to bring comfort to others.

Our sages teach that on Rosh Hashanah our fates are written and on Yom Kippur they are sealed. The Midrash adds that one who dies during the days in between is given a siman yafeh — a good sign — for their soul. To die during this sacred time is seen as a sign of spiritual closeness to God.

Our Jewish mourning traditions provide a spiritual structure for grieving. Before burial comes aninut, the stunned stillness that accompanies fresh loss. With burial, shiva begins — seven days of remembering, comforting and community embrace. Then shloshim, 30 days of gradual return to daily life. Jewish mourning does not rush mourning; it gives it dignity and form.

In Hebrew, the word for a coffin is *Aron*, the same word used for the *Aron HaKodesh*, the Holy Ark that holds the Torah scrolls. The sages saw meaning in this. Just as the Aron HaKodesh carries sacred words written on parchment, the Aron (burial coffin), holds a person who carries sacred words written on their skin. Each one of us is a living scroll, and written upon our bodies is the Torah of our lives. This is called *Torat Chayim*, the Torah of Life. When we accompany someone to burial, we are in truth escorting an ark that carries a sacred scroll, our beloved.

My mother's life was filled with Torah — not only the kind written on parchment, but the Torah of kindness, song, and teaching. For decades, she served as a Hebrew school principal and cantor, shaping generations of Jewish children and inspiring countless families. She profoundly influenced my own path toward the rabbinate. Had she been born in another era — not amid the Great Depression and World War II — I have no doubt she would have become a rabbi herself. She grew up in an era when women were not permitted to become rabbis. Her passion as a woman in Jewish leadership was far ahead of her time.

My family and I have been deeply moved by the love and support that you, our congregation, have shown throughout shiva. Your calls, visits, and prayers have been a great source of comfort and strength. May the memory of my mother, Carolyn Wilfond (*Chaya Brana Bat Dov Ber haLevy v'Shira*) be for a blessing, and may all who mourn be comforted among the mourners of Zion and Jerusalem.

#### CANTOR'S MESSAGE

#### A Jewish Mother's Guilt

It is the week of Sukkot when we read from the book of Ecclesiastes the well-known verses:

"To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven: A time to be born, and a time to die; A time to weep, and a time to laugh; A time to mourn, and a time to dance....A time to seek, and a time to lose."

We just concluded Yom Kippur, where my most profound moment of *nachas* came during the Yizkor service, when I sang "Hallelujah" by Leonard Cohen, while my eldest son Alex Simpson played the lyre, the ancient musical instrument of King David that is mentioned in the lyrics. Singing and playing that piece together brought me to that profoundly spiritual moment that cantors, but most importantly mothers, hope for and dream of. I hope you joined me in feeling God's presence in the sanctuary at that moment. It was a spiritual high!

And yet, days later, in this same season, on October 7th, I posted a picture on Facebook of the Bibas children in their Batman costumes juxtaposed with a picture of my sons Alex and Ian dressed as Batman and Robin and wrote these words: "I got to see my Batman and Robin grow up. TWO YEARS TOO MANY! On this horrific anniversary, and in what is supposed to be this season of joy, I pray, no I plead, that the sons of other Jewish parents are returned to their families and that together we find a path to an everlasting peace so that all parents can hug and kiss and dress their children up as Batman."

Then days later, still during Sukkot in our season of joy, on the eve of Simchat Torah, I sat on my couch until 2:20 am, literally holding my breath while losing the ability to keep my eyes open, desperately watching for the first of our Israeli sons to be released after two years held hostage by Hamas. I'll admit, I got as far as seeing the first Red Cross truck leaving Gaza with the young men inside before I couldn't stay awake any longer. It probably would have been better had I gone to bed early and woken up early, but the Jewish mama bear in me just couldn't go to sleep until I saw something.

That morning, it was a time to dance and a time to celebrate, as we watched 20 men returned to their country, their families, their wives, their moms. I was elated. Again, a moment of profound joy, of relief. I heard the wailing of parents and connected to moments when I've experienced similar sorrow mixed with joy, though I cannot imagine the magnitude of both of these emotions for these parents. I sat and cried and smiled and cheered.

But these moments were fleeting, as I began to focus on the grief of the parents whose sons were not returned to them on October 13th. Did they know they were not going to see their sons, their husbands, their fathers again or did the return of the living hostages confirm the worst fears of the parents whose sons did not return? Had they prepared to grieve while others rejoice? Rachel Goldberg-Polin, mother of slain hostage Hersh Goldberg-Polin, eloquently expressed, "We are all elated and relieved for the families... It is what everyone has worked and prayed for these 736 torturous and inexplicable days. And at the exact time, we embrace with tenderness

the families of children and loved ones who we pray will come back to be buried. How do we hold these paradoxical and yet appropriate sensations at the same time? Please, dear God, let us do it with delicate tenderness and holiness toward each other."

And so I sit, a Jewish mother, struggling with guilt that I am both happy and sad, relieved for some families and grieving along with others. Happy that I got to dress my kids up like Batman and Robin while other families, on both sides of this tragedy, will not experience this joy...and won't experience a profound moment in a Temple sanctuary with their Batman, now grown up. Accept the moments of guilt, but, most importantly, embrace the seasons of joy.

Based upon recent statistics, Bread & Roses needs your unwavering support as its impact has grown by 1,000% this

year, including 81,818 pounds of community meals served, 657,085 pounds of food distributed to partner organizations, 2 million pounds of rescued food, 1,634,853 pantry meals, and 826,070 pounds of emergency pantry orders. 10,000 pounds (10%) of the 90,000 pounds of food donated annually comes from food drives at temples, churches, and schools.

#### **Eliora Wilfond**


November 8, 2025






