RABBI'S MESSAGE

Soon the Shofar Will Sound

Soon the shofar will sound, summoning us to return to our roots, rebuild our bonds, and renew our commitments.

On Rosh Hashanah, we read the story of Ishmael—cast into the wilderness, crying beneath a bush, while his mother Hagar weeps from a distance. And then, the Torah tells us: "And God heard the voice of the boy..." (Genesis 21:17). Not the voice of the mother. Not even her prayer. The Torah says God heard the voice of the boy—a fragile voice, a frightened cry, a broken sound.

This is the voice the shofar awakens in us. According to Pirkei D'Rabbi Eliezer, the shofar is meant to recall not only the ram at the Akedah (the binding of Isaac), but also the tears of Hagar, the sobbing of Ishmael and the cries of children throughout history—cries whose pain

still reaches heaven. This is the voice the shofar awakens in us. Each blast of the shofar echoes Ishmael's cry. It is a sound of sorrow, but also of being heard. A cry from brokenness, met with rachmanes (divine compassion). Just as God heard Ishmael ba'asher hu sham—"as he was, right there"—so too does the shofar remind us that we are heard as we are: raw, imperfect, and broken... yet beloved.

This Rosh Hashanah, we don't need to be whole to be holy. We return through our brokenness. We rebuild from our honest tears. We renew not by pretending, but by crying out—and allowing God, and one another, to truly hear us. Soon the shofar will sound, and when it does, may we listen not only to its voice, but also to the Ishmael within us all.

We are thrilled that Uri is serving as our congregation's Tour Guide for our upcoming Israel trip, April 11–18, 2026. We all have questions about Israel—its challenges, complexities and its promise. Come learn with Uri, and consider joining me, Uri and your Temple community this coming April as we travel together to experience the beauty, the hope and the reality of Israel firsthand.

CANTOR'S MESSAGE

In front of our beautiful Temple Emanuel building, we have some apple trees. Some would label them as "crab" apple trees, but I don't like labels and "crab" can sometimes have a negative connotation. The other morning, I was walking into the building and noticed the sizable apples on the trees. My first thought was "This is the first sign of Rosh Hashanah in nature, right here at our front door." Of course, we've been busy with preparations for the High Holy Days in the office all summer, but the apples on the trees were God's and nature's first sign to me that the New Year is approaching.

I also noticed while walking past that there were a few apples on the ground, and some of them were eaten, at least partially. Interestingly enough, I saw this as a sign too. I took a moment to look at the tree, look at the half-eaten apples on the path into the Temple and reflect on the year. Friends, I'm not going to sugar coat it...or the apples. Our world has been in a challenging place this past year, wherever you look. My goal is not to editorialize about politics or natural disasters, or war, or famine, or social justice issues. These issues

are front and center everywhere we look. For the moment, I want to look at symbolism and signs we get from God and nature, and how we can interpret them.

When I saw the half-eaten apples on my path, my mind immediately went to two idioms. The first one was "Is the glass half empty or half full? Is the apple half eaten or half whole. Sounds silly, right? But, I thought, the apple is a symbol of our Jewish New Year, and here is an apple. Is it half gone or half whole? It's all in how you look at it, isn't it? It's a matter of perspective. My mind also jumped to the idiom of "making lemonade out of lemons." Here's a half-eaten apple. Do we throw the other half out? Should it be left for another animal to eat? What can be done with a half-eaten apple? What can be made or done with half-eaten fruit? Why is this apple in my path for me to trip over?

I actually think that half-eaten, or half-whole, apple was put in my path for me to take pause. To look at that tree and find the beauty in it. To find the symbolism as we approach the New Year. To think about the importance of perspective. To think about how we can take the half-eaten apples in our lives and in the world, and maybe not make them whole again, but look at them differently and do something, take action using a different outlook, a renewed outlook. Don't be afraid to look around you for the signs that tell you, yes the world may be like a half-eaten apple, but it's also half whole. We all have the ability to do something in our lives and in our world to make a half whole again in a new way in a new year.

SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

Andover's Fifth Annual Juneteenth Block Party style celebration on Central Temple Emanuel continues to be a vital force for justice and compassion in the Merrimack Valley, embodying the Jewish principle of *tikkun olam*—repairing the world. Our efforts span direct service, advocacy and education, with a strong emphasis on food security, clothing drives and education. Monthly meal preparation and delivery for Bread & Roses in Lawrence, warm clothing drives for Debbie's Treasure Chest, and partnerships with the Village Food Hub for the Community Fridge and Pantry are just a few examples of how the Temple's leadership mobilizes its members to meet urgent local needs.

In the spirit of the Anti-Defamation League's (ADL) commitment to civil rights and combating hate, Temple Emanuel continues to engage in civic advocacy and educational programming. Our participation in RAC-MA's "Every Voice, Every Vote" campaign promoted voter engagement and racial justice, while our speaker series events—such as those addressing wrongful convictions and reproductive rights—brought critical social issues to the forefront of community dialogue. These initiatives ensure that our Jewish values of equity and inclusion are translated into meaningful action. Andover's Juneteenth celebration this year was fantastic! Our interfaith collaboration with several local churches under the dynamic leadership of the Andover Baptist Church's Denise Wynn, helped organize a block party that honored the history and significance of Juneteenth. This collaboration underscores Temple Emanuel's commitment to fostering inclusivity and understanding.

With federal funding cuts—such as the USDA's cancellation of over \$200,000 in food deliveries to the Merrimack Valley Food Bank—threatening essential services, Temple Emanuel will continue to step in to help fill the gap. Your generosity during the High Holiday Food Drive, donations to the Bread & Roses Fund, volunteer mobilization, and strategic partnerships with nonprofits like Groundwork Lawrence and Habitat for Humanity help sustain programs that would otherwise falter. Thank you for your past efforts to provide immediate relief and also your commitment to strengthening the social fabric of the region, ensuring that vulnerable families continue to receive support even when government aid falls short.


