RABBI'S MESSAGE

There is a Jewish saying: "Joy shared is joy multiplied; sorrow shared is half a sorrow." This is the blessing of being part of a Jewish community. Thank you for joining us in our daughter's recent bat mitzvah. It was such a gift to dance together, to celebrate life and hope, and to feel the deep gratitude of a true *Shehechiyanu* moment. Life is short and precious, and the ability to walk life's journey together is at the heart of what it means to be a *kehilah kedoshah*—a sacred community.

On Friday, January 9, we will celebrate *Shabbat Shemot*, the Shabbat of Names. If you have never received a Hebrew name, please let me know. I would be honored to help you choose one that resonates with your story and spirit. During the service, we will hold a special ceremony in which you can receive your Hebrew name and a naming certificate. A Jewish name is a prayer of hope. May we each grow into the blessing of our names. If you want to receive a name during the Jewish Naming Ceremony please contact the Temple office.

On Friday, January 30, we will celebrate *Shabbat Shirah*, the Shabbat of Song, with a musical service and will welcome a special guest, Gilad Skolnik, who will speak about Leket Israel, an inspiring social action organization that rescues surplus food to feed the poor and hungry. Israel is more than "the conflict." It is a vibrant society striving to bring Jewish values to life, including feeding the hungry. Together we will explore how Temple Emanuel can bring this mitzvah to our own community.

During the Shabbat evening service on Friday, February 6, we will host Linda Goodspeed, a leader of the Community Hevra Kadisha North Shore Boston, a Jewish burial society. She will speak about *Tahara*, the sacred ritual that preserves dignity and compassion for our loved ones who have recently passed. This mitzvah is known as *hesed shel emet*, "true and faithful love," because it is done for someone who cannot repay us or even say thank you. Come learn about this holy work and the ways each of us can be a part of it.
